
YOUR COMMUNITY PHARMACIES

"During a domiciliary visit for a patient taking warfarin (a blood thinner), a member of the pharmacy team found a gentleman who had fallen over in the garden. There was blood all down the garden path which alerted her to a problem. She knocked and walked straight in. He had his head over the sink, there was a great deal of blood. She rang an ambulance and he was in hospital for a couple of days."

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"Being the father of four children aged 6-13, bugs and illnesses are quite easily picked up which can make life very difficult. Our pharmacy is open until 10pm so it makes it really easy to speak to our pharmacist for advice. I had a near fatal bout of pneumonia a few years ago and knowing this, the pharmacist told me about a pneumonia jab which gave peace of mind to me and my family.




"A patient came into the pharmacy very upset.
He had been discharged from hospital with lots of new medicines to take. He was confused and his severe arthritis made it impossible to open the medicine bottles. I went through all his medicines with him and the counter staff put his medicines into bottles with easy open lids."

"During heavy snow, we couldn't get out on the roads to deliver medicines so we did many by foot.

I had a phone call from a patient who was extremely concerned as he'd run out of insulin. I organised an emergency prescription with the surgery and then, rucksack on my back (containing several deliveries),trudged through the snow to reach the patient's house and duly delivered their insulin.

They were so grateful for my efforts."

If they didn't offer this service, I'd have to pay to park in town to go to my GP surgery and then pay again 48 hours later to collect my prescription. They've also been really helpful in helping with minor medical queries which have meant I haven't had to visit my GP."
